





## The Hot Pink Rink

On March 22, 2008, Coney Island was the scene of the opening of Lola Staar's Dreamland Roller Rink, at the old Child's Restaurant building on 21st Street and the Boardwalk. The building had been vacant for half a century. An interesting coincidence of numbers here - Child's opened in '22, and the pink rink, on March 22 - a dream come true.

A whisper of the opening of a rink in Coney Island had been circulating for several months, exciting the imagination of the rink starved NYC skate community with the possibility of a home base. Upon investigating, I learned that the entrepreneur who seemed on the verge of making the rumor a reality was Lola Staar, proprietor of the Lola Staar

Souvenir Boutique on the Boardwalk.

Lola, to my great surprise, turned out to be a former student, known to me as Dianna Carlin who attended my skate classes several years ago. She had always been fascinated with roller skating and as the founder of the Save Coney Island Organization, her vision was to open a roller rink there on the Boardwalk. She said "My idea is to save the spirit of Coney Island and the rink will do that and bring something positive to the community."

That fantasy was brought to fruition by the "Make a Dream Come True" competition sponsored by Tommy Hilfiger and Glamour Magazine. She

entered her dream and won.

The opening party was glitz and glitter galore with attendees from all over the spectrum, whirling and rollicking under the ceramic eyes of a terra cotta relief of King Neptune. There was a wide variety of skaters of all ages. shapes and skills, stilt walkers, hoola hoopers, dancers, punk rockers, the Gotham Girls Roller Derby Team, a magician, acrobats, everyone decked out in outrageous fashions and costumes in a multitude of colors and styles, not to mention a number of police and firemen who appeared caught up in the magic of the moment. A phalanx of photographers and video cameras recorded the festivities for posterity.

The festive atmosphere of the rink made one almost forget its defects – small by our standards about 50' x 100' - it had a plastic modular floor with a flaw - a bit of a hump that extended for several feet at one end of the skating surface and which caused a few spills till the skaters got used to it. # **The View from Skaters Road**

Every year the Skate Circle is a little different. This year there are a few changes, small things that are not readily apparent to the casual visitor. The die hard park skaters who are out in the park year-round have seen the changes, voiced their opinions and taken it all in stride. The regulars know we are trying to offer the safest environment for dance-skating possible, and they are doing their part to find creative ways to let the dance party rock while keeping it safe for skaters to roll.

Over the past few seasons, small changes had huge repercussions and unintended consequences. When the DJ and the speakers were turned west, the attention of the Circle focused into the small area between the booth and the path where spectators gather.

Starting with a few skaters showing off their best moves for a few seconds and then continuing around the rink; it grew to include dancers playing to the crowd. Soon, there were three rows of people milling around, some who just leaned on the barricades staring at the DJ, a few dancers and skatedancers fighting for space, but mostly people standing around watching, talking, posturing, taking pictures...doing everything but dancing.

The usable rink area constricted to less than half its width, because it had become a stage and the spectators behind the ropes were the audience. The people in the "show" lost sight of the primarily purpose of the Skate Circle as a place to rollerskate. Complaints about congestion around the booth kept rolling in from long time skaters - dues-paying members of the CPDSA. There were accidents and injuries and we struggled to keep it safe. To make things worse, a number of people were bringing in canvas folding chairs and setting them up in the dance area north of the DJ booth. By the end of last season, there was a long line of chairs, with bags and food and drinks on the ground and there was

hardly any room to dance or

To correct these problems, the DJ now faces North into the dance/ skate area. We have asked our skaters and dancers to move themselves back into the dance areas to keep the rink open. A few skaters still linger in the west area to show off their moves, but the focus has changed. There is no "stage." Dancing has moved to the areas north and south of the booth and the Circle is more of a "theater in the round"...at least that's what we would like to see. It can work if you help.

Many thanks to DJ Jay Stewart for keeping the Winter Circle rolling for the diehard skaters, like Leroy, Janis, Beth and James who kept the park skating tradition alive every weekend day that was remotely skatable. Nick's after-party kept the dancing hot even on the coldest days.

Early this year CPDSA Engineer "Segway" Bill Levy announced that he and his wife, Patricia, were moving to Arizona. Bill has been a major asset for the Skate Circle over the years. He engineered and maintained the extremely rugged sound system that has been the basis for the CPDSA's audio since we began in 1995. For many years Bill took responsibility for setting up the DJ booth and the sound system every day that the CPDSA was in the park. We all owe him an enormous debt of gratitude for

his technical expertise, hard work and dedication to the Circle in fair weather and foul. Thank you, Bill.

We must also thank DJ Julio for sharing his knowledge of electronic gear and his guidance in helping the CPDSA put together our new DJ console. We believe that this new, more professional configuration will simplify our sound system and make it easier for DJs to connect their ever more sophisticated equipment into our system.

I should mention the rest of the team who set up, and break down the sound system every day we play - our new chief engineer William and the audio crew: Tom, Alicia, Big Ed, John and Stan. Rounding out the crew are Tall blond Ken, Ed the Photographer, Muscle Ed, Tyrone, Chris and Maria.
