The CPDSA at 21

The CPDSA and the USA share the 4th of July as a symbol of independence and freedom. For us, the 4th was the first trial day when we were allowed to play music for our skaters in the park after three months of being silenced by Mayor Guiliani.

Negotiating an agreement with the Parks Department had been a lengthy process. During the months between April and July, we were not allowed to play amplified music during our skate sessions. In order to keep the Circle rolling and keep the skaters showing up, Stu Popovitz—one of our skaters who is an electronics engineer—built a small portable FM transmitter for us to broadcast our music at 87.9 FM. Jay Stewart was our DJ on the day of our first Broadcast.

We skated to the music playing in our headphones connected to FM walkmen, cassette tape players with FM receivers and any other device that could pick up the signal. Sometimes two skaters, dancing together, were plugged into the same walkman; which could be tricky. Our group stayed together because we could continue to skate to music. Our strength, our shared bond, was our love of skating; it kept us together and forced us to grow up and take responsibility.

On the 4th of July, 1995, we had all the requisite permits. The eyes of the Guiliani administration, the Parks Department and the Police were on us, to see if we could follow all the rules. Which they doubted, because the rules were very restrictive: music no louder than 85db at fifty feet away, no vendors, no signs bigger than two by three, strict adherence to the limited hours of amplified sound and clean up all trash at the end of the session.

There were other rules, requirements and limitation too numerous to list here. The expectation of the City agencies was that we could not muster the discipline to keep our part of the bargain. They didn't count on the determination and perseverance of our diverse group of Skaters.

On the 4th of July, 1995 we had our first trial day of playing music out loud under all of the permits and rules negotiated with the City. We passed the test. That was twenty one years ago. Now, we continue to skate and play music in compliance with all the rules and regulations. We present an organized, safe place where anyone can come and skate; where kids can learn to skate among skaters. Where all skaters are welcome to join us and where we are all doing something we love.

The Central Park Dance Skaters Association of New York City—that's where!

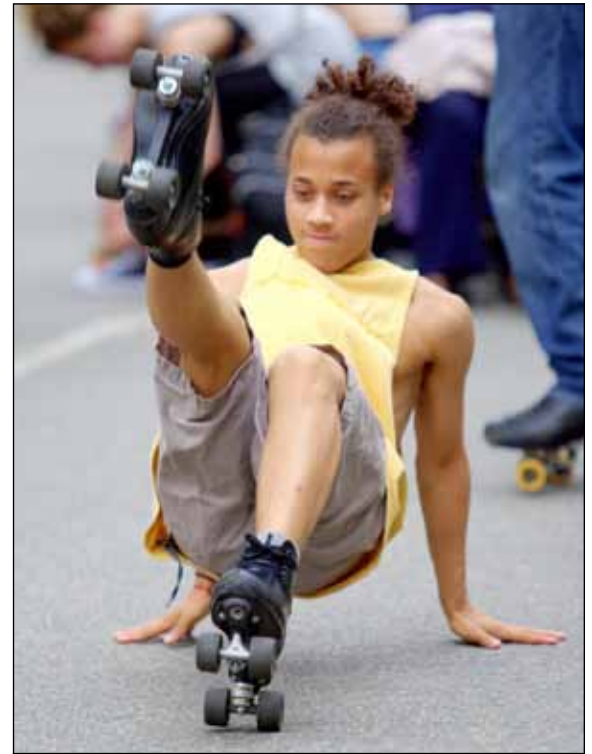

The View from Skaters Road

This spring has been a very busy time in Central Park. Every race, march and corporate event in New York wants to have its day in the park and they all want to be there in May or June. The Conservancy and Parks Department limit the location of these events to the paved area around the Bandshell and the Center Drive area.

The CPDSA holds our Skate Circle on the north end of Center Drive, which is unavailable to us when an event is scheduled. Big events pay big money for their use of the Park. As a community group that has been “Grandfathered” in to hold our Skate Circle when there is no paying event; we, very obviously, occupy a second or third tier in the event hierarchy.

The good news is that in July and August, when summer turns up the heat on New York City, those events depart and head for cooler summer homes. In July and August, the park is ours. Except for the Triathlon on July 23rd and 24th we are in the park every weekend, Saturdays and Sundays straight through Labor Day weekend. We lose the last Saturday in August to the Central Park Film Festival, but even still, this is our time to skate in the park.

The challenge now is in the everyday tasks that keep the Circle going, moving the barricades and the sound equipment; setting up and breaking down. We sweep the grounds clean, put up signs to help visitors understand our rules and get the sound system ready for the DJ. Once the music starts playing, we put our skates on and do our thing.

That’s why we are here: to skate and dance on skates, it’s what we do, to exercise, socialize and have fun. We charge no admission, but as participants in the Circle continue to return to us, we hope that they will pay the Circle back by pitching in and helping our volunteers with the work at the beginning or the end of the day. One additional person working for a few minutes with our set up and break down crews, can mean a lot to the others on the team.

The CPDSA has survived for 21 years, so far. We have weathered many storms, literally and figuratively. We do whatever is necessary to keep the Circle rolling. Some give money, some help with the day to day physical work, some just come and skate with us and feel that their presence is enough of a contribution.

Because we are a non profit community organization, dedicated to bringing joy into our lives through roller skating and roller dancing, the important thing for each of us—who gets so much from the Skate Circle—is to figure out what we can do to give back.

No one can be there every time we meet, but everyone can do something to help each time he or she skates with us. If we work together, the CPDSA and the Skate Circle can continue for a very long time, but if too many of you just walk away and leave the work to others, we cannot last for long. If you love the Skate Circle and want to have it continue, you must find a way to contribute to its continued existence.

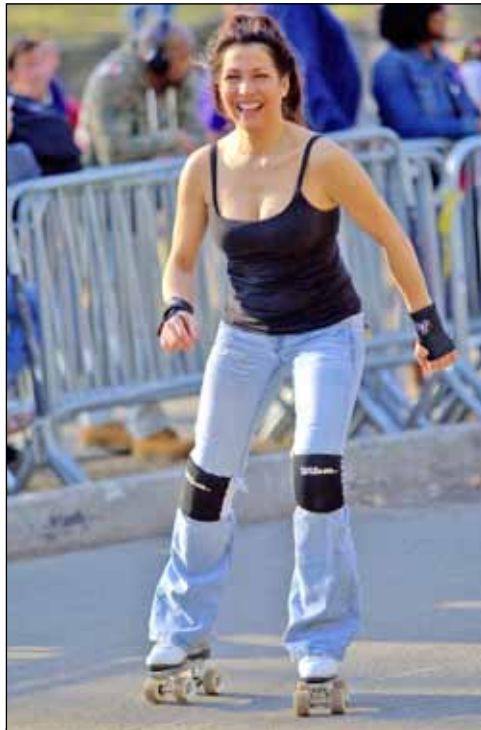
